Chaddock impacts the lives of children and families in the local community through Foster & Adoption Services provided in Adams, Brown, Hancock and Pike counties and school-based counseling offered at eight schools in Adams County. In addition, Chaddock serves children statewide through the work of Caregiver Connections, which provides early childhood mental health consultation to child care centers and home-based providers across Illinois.



Chaddock's Developmental Trauma and Attachment Program (DTAP) brings hope and healing to children and youth who have experienced severe trauma and struggle with attachment-related difficulties. Of the children and youth served through DTAP in the past five years, 88% have a history of psychiatric hospitalization and 65% were adopted privately, internationally or through the foster care system.

DTAP's foundation is an in-depth understanding of brain development and the impact of trauma on a child's ability to form attachments with primary caregivers. DTAP incorporates the whole family system into a child's treatment plan and can be delivered in three treatment options: In-Home Intensive, Residential and Accelerated Residential.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Chaddock School served children and youth completing treatment in Chaddock's residential program, as well as youth from 17 area school districts who have not experienced success in the traditional public school setting. Teachers at Chaddock School are special education certified and receive continuous training to keep up with the latest therapeutic and academic approaches.

With a low teacher to student ratio, Chaddock School provides challenging learning experiences while building meaningful relationships in a therapeutic environment focused on developing healthy, engaged, and productive students. Throughout the school year, students participated in the annual Science Expo and Living History Exhibit. Student creativity was on display at the school's first Art Show and students took part in building and decorating Chaddock's Dogwood Parade Float.

Everyone has great communication concerning my child. His treatment team knows him very well and works very well with him. I could not ask for a better therapist, case manager, cottage supervisor and overall staff.

With trauma-informed approaches incorporated throughout the student experience, the Chaddock School teachers, therapists and support staff meet students where they are both behaviorally and academically. For many students, the focus is to keep them engaged in school while they work toward a return to their public school district.

The Knowledge Center at Chaddock (TKC) reinforces Chaddock's reputation as a leader in the field of developmental trauma and attachment by directing efforts toward clinicians, educators and families whose lives and work are impacted by developmental trauma and attachment disorders, as well as capacity building for non-profit leaders.

TKC amplified its impact in FY19 by evolving from service line focused on training and consultation to become its own corporation as part of Chaddock's organizational restructure plan. TKC extended Chaddock's reach through in-person training, online webinars, clinical consultation/ supervision, blogs, podcasts and publications within the areas of developmental trauma, attachment and organizational leadership.

Chaddock Behavioral Health (CBH), established in FY19 as part of Chaddock's organizational restructure plan, focuses on the electronic health record needs for human service agencies through the ownership and development of FlexAMS. Chaddock acquired the electronic health record system, formerly known as FlexDSI, when the owners of the system opted to discontinue their business.

Throughout FY19, Chaddock's Flex team and software developers worked together to update a number of aspects of the Flex system, develop new modules and rebrand the system as FlexAMS. The long range goal for Chaddock Behavioral Health is to build the FlexAMS customer base thus generating a new revenue stream to support direct care programs provided by Chaddock Attachment & Trauma Services.



SUPPORTING OUR IMPACT

The Children's Foundation provides the opportunity for people to share their time, talent, and treasure in support of Chaddock's mission. The Foundation accepts and manages all charitable contributions made to Chaddock. These contributions fill the financial gap between the actual cost of the services provided and reimbursement for those services. During FY19, 6% of Chaddock's program expenses were supported by charitable funds.

The Foundation staff maintains regular contact with donors through a variety of mailings, phone calls and personal visits; shares the Chaddock story with civic groups and churches across Illinois (90 speaking engagements in FY19); coordinates grant proposals to support Chaddock care/services and manages volunteer groups who serve on campus. During FY19, the Foundation staff processed 2,884 donations from individuals, churches and other organizations.
